Beginnings

The school was founded in 1889 in Milledgeville, Georgia, as a public women's educational center. First known as Georgia Normal & Industrial College, the university also has been named Georgia State College for Women, the Women's College of Georgia, Georgia College, and, since 1996, Georgia College & State University.

Georgia College has programs of study in five colleges – the College of Arts and Sciences, the J. Whitney Bunting College of Business and Technology, the John H. Lounsbury College of Education, the College of Health Sciences, and the John E. Sallstrom Honors College.

Class Sizes

As Georgia's designated public liberal arts university, small classes that give ample opportunity for individual student attention are common. Most class sections enroll between 15 and 35 students. Seminars, tutorials and honors courses typically enroll 20 to 25 students with three faculty facilitators.

Total Economic Impact Locally

The economic impact of the university on a six-county region is calculated to be more than \$285 million for fiscal year 2021, according to a study released in 2022 by the University System of Georgia.

Tuition Fiscal Year 22-23

Tuition and fees for a full-time undergraduate student who is a resident of the state of Georgia are \$4,487 per semester. Out-of-state tuition for full-time undergraduate students is \$14,077 per semester.

In February 2022 during her inaugural state of the university address, President Cathy Cox announced the beginning of a new strategic planning process. The process was envisioned to be inclusive, ambitious, and forward thinking with a charge to infuse innovation and creativity in all that university does. This new strategic plan will be a way to imagine how Georgia College delivers on its mission as the state's designated public liberal arts university and to ensure that the university is preparing students for successful careers and fulfilling lives.

The Strategic Planning Committee is comprised of broad representation from across the campus community to ensure that diverse perspectives can be incorporated. It was also tasked with ensuring that both internal and external university stakeholders would be engaged in order to make important contributions to the shape and direction of the overall strategic plan.

The plan and its pillars will be released in early 2023, and will provide a blueprint for implementation to guide the university through 2030.






Distribution of Revenue by Source Fiscal Year 2021-22





Distribution of Expenditures by Function Fiscal Year 2021-22







Distribution of Sponsored Expenditures by Project Type Fiscal Year 2021-22



The Learning Center provides enrolled students with the academic support they need to be more confident with course content as well as tips and tools with how to effectively use their study time. Certified Peer Tutors work 1-on-1 and in small group settings assisting with STEM and economics courses in our drop-in Learning Center. Supplemental Instruction Leaders (SI) are embedded in and dedicated to one course for the entire semester; the leaders facilitate two interactive, collaborative SI study sessions for the enrolled students each week. The Math Lab supports two specific math classes with a team of Undergraduate Learning Assistants who assist with course concepts and learning strategies.





Athletics 2021-22 Points of Pride

- Bobcat Athletics has a 93 percent Academic Success Rate, tops among all Division II public schools.
- Bobcat Men's Basketball qualified for the NCAA Tournament and won 20-plus games, both for the first time in 12 years.
- Across all sports, the Bobcats had 45 student-athletes win PBC Team of Academic Distinction honors.
- The Bobcats had a pair of PBC Elite 16 award winners in Men's Tennis' Ben Grunert and Brandon Thomas of Men's Basketball. Grunert was the first to win the award in GCSU Men's Tennis history.
- GCSU Men's Basketball senior Jordan Thomas broke the school's career scoring record, a mark that has lasted since 1979. Thomas finished with 2,219 career points, good for fourth in Peach Belt Conference history.
- Emilia Richter of Bobcat Women's Tennis was named an ITA All-American, the first for GCSU Women's Tennis since 2006 and the 24th overall. Richter went 16-5 in singles, including 6-1 in conference play and also earned All-Peach Belt in singles for the second time.
- On Sept. 18, 2021, Bobcat Volleyball coach Gretchen Krumdieck won her 100th career match.






GC JOURNEYS PARTICIPATION BY EXPERIENCE





Distribution of Degree and Major Awards by Degree Level, Fiscal Year 2021-22








6-Year Graduation Rate



Highest Degrees of Full-Time Instructional Staff by Rank





VIRTUAL LEARNING SERIES FOR EARLY LANGUAGE AND LITERACY: PREPARING CHILDREN FOR LANGUAGE, LITERACY, AND LIFE

The Preparing Children for Language, Literacy, and Life virtual series was held to help build successful pathways for children from birth to age five, accomplished by transforming early language training provided to the infant, toddler, and early childhood workforce as well as to parents and caregivers. This series supported participants' exploration of key concepts, research, and concrete strategies from ZERO TO THREE's The Growing Brain: From Birth to 5 Years Old curriculum. The series was comprised of four 90-minute interactive webinars expertly facilitated by ZERO TO THREE faculty, including:

2022 ANNUAL GOVERNOR'S SUMMIT: AMPLIFY EVIDENCE-BASED EARLY LANGUAGE AND LITERACY PRACTICES TO ACCELERATE CHILDREN'S SUCCESS

The 2022 Governor's Summit, held on June 15 and June 16, 2022, on the campus of Georgia College State and University in Milledgeville, convened state and local policy leaders with 21 cross-sector teams focused on the birth to third grade continuum. Sectors included those with an emphasis on: early childhood education, elementary education, government, local Family Connection Collaboratives, community-based organizations, business, healthcare, philanthropy, and higher education. These teams engaged collaboratively to form shared understandings around practices for building strong pathways to early language and literacy development for children and families.

Several guest speakers presented about language development as a well-being indicator, connecting research to practice to effectively embed evidence-based methods, and cultivating collaborative alignment and delivery of evidence-based early language and literacy practices among organizations working with children from birth through age eight.

2022 IMPACT

IMPROVEMENT SCIENCE:

A Systematic, Research-based Approach to Early Language and Literacy Development

To ensure successful pathways for literacy development for all children birth through age eight, the work of the Deal Center includes research to study the success of quality improvement processes. Thus, our focus is on advancement rather than individual programs and interventions. We aim to close the research-to-practice gap that hinders the adoption of evidence-based practices (EBPs). As part of our approach to improvement science, the Deal Center incorporates implementation science to support the use of EBPs.

THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM OF GEORGIA (USG) LITERACY REVIEW, A REVIEW OF THE EDUCATOR PREPARATION PROCESS IN EARLY READING INSTRUCTION

The Deal Center partnered with the University System of Georgia's (USG) Academic Affairs Division to review the Education Preparation Programs (EPPs) at selected public universities in the state of Georgia.

The purpose of the USG Literacy Review was to investigate potential explanations for the variability in the knowledge of evidence-based reading practices (pedagogical and content knowledge) as well as the variability in implementation of EBPs in the classroom among kindergarten through third grade teachers. To investigate potential sources for the variability, a number of research questions guided the initiative, including those around knowledge, adaptability, self-efficacy, standards, program characteristics, and change.

At the conclusion of this study, we found a significant variability in knowledge and practice among classroom teachers and hypothesize it may be attributed to a number of factors. Moreover, this project was an effort to investigate the education preparation process as one potential source of these differences among teachers. The measures and resulting data from faculty pedagogical content knowledge, attitudes toward EBP in reading, and course content indicate they are likely contributing to the variability observed among teachers.

MISSION:

The Rural Studies Institute (RSI) at Georgia College serves to highlight and strengthen rural communities as a catalyst for community education and engagement, community-based participatory research and scholarship. The work of the RSI at Georgia College is grounded in interdisciplinary discovery and collaborative approach to identify innovative solutions to the challenges facing rural communities. The Institute does this by advancing thought leadership, community awareness, exploration, and ideas that examine societal priorities, policy, practice and existing institutional structures that impact the well-being of rural communities. In operation since January 2020, the Institute was established to address rural disparities, with particular focus on the Southern region. The RSI at Georgia College aims to build asset focused approaches to rural sustainability, development and growth. Supporting the liberal arts mission of the Institute, the RSI at Georgia College is dedicated to building the capacity of rural communities through transformations of narrative, action and practice.

HIGHLIGHTS FOR 2021-2022:

The RSI focused on four areas of action: Thought Leadership, Original Research, and Education and Outreach efforts.

Community Technical Assistance

The RSI at Georgia College is dedicated to providing technical assistance to various constituents in order to address disparities in rural communities. The RSI at Georgia College also sponsored a virtual Rural Institute at the 2021 Minorities in Agriculture, Natural Resources and Related Sciences (MANRRS) Fall conference. The Institute was attended by 76 student participants from around the country.

Transformative Learning Experiences and Sponsored Research

The RSI at Georgia College received several grants to conduct research on rural America. The RSI was awarded a \$37,00 sub award for SARS COV-2 Vaccines Information Equity and Demand Creation (COVIED) program in collaboration with Emory University and John Hopkins to host listening sessions on vaccine hesitancy of COVID-19 vaccines and boosters in the rural South. Host communities included Western Kentucky, East Alabama, West Alabama, Augusta, Georgia and Albany Georgia. Our team partners included members of the respective communities and Kentucky State University, Tuskegee University, the Medical College of Georgia, the Federation of Southern Cooperatives, AgFirst Cooperative and the 100 Black Men of Augusta.

The RSI also supported student collaborative work on rural studies with graduate students at Tuskegee University, Emory University, and Yale University. The RSI at Georgia College was awarded a subaward for HRSA VAT project, \$65,000 from the Center for Global Health Initiative (CGHI) to lead a community health education and outreach team with host communities in the states of Alabama, Georgia and Kentucky. Our 22-member team included community members and member partners from Kentucky State



University, Tuskegee University, the Federation of Southern Cooperatives, and AgFirst Cooperative. Our team was able to administer over 3,000 vaccines and boosters in our partner communities.

The Rural Studies Institute at Georgia College also collaborated with several Georgia College faculty to support presentations and/or classroom collaborations including; Dr. Sunita Manian and the Department of Philosophy, Religion and Liberal Studies, Dr. Brian Newsome and John E. Sallstrom Honors College, Dr. Sandra Godwin and the Sociology program, Dr. Charles Ubah and the 2021 SEMAU conference, and Dr. Kelley Ditzel and the MPA program, as well as the GC Sustainability Conference.

The RSI established an MOU with the University of Georgia College of Public Health to host a Public Health graduate student for Summer of 2022.

IMPACT:

Presentations on Rural America:

The Rural Studies Institute at Georgia College provided education and outreach opportunities on rural America with a diverse group of constituents and stakeholders including the Georgia College Foundation Board, The Georgia Chamber's American Rural Prosperity Annual Conference, the American Geographical Society, The Othering and Belonging Institute UC Berkeley, Institute of Politics, University of Chicago, Yale University Agrarian Studies program, Bridges Conference on Developing the Rural South, Together for Hope, and the Institute of Public and Preventative Health Augusta University.


Virtual Events

The Rural Studies Institute at Georgia College hosted two virtual events during 2021-2022. These events were the The Economics of Rural Education virtual discussion featuring the Georgia Partnership for Excellence in Education and the Georgia Budget & Policy Institute. This event had 85 participants from around the country. The second virtual event was a Master Class on Heirs Property with Attorney Veronica McClendon. This master class had 42 participants.

Partners in RSI Work

The RSI at Georgia College established and strengthened existing partnerships in order to accomplish the goals of the Institute. These partners include the University of Georgia College of Public Health, Tuskegee University, the Kentucky State University, Drawdown Georgia Business Compact, McClendon Law and Consulting, and the CREATE program with Milledgeville and Georgia Power Company.

As a public institute, the RSI at Georgia College focuses on outreach to the community and currently has 315 Facebook Followers and 453 individuals on its emailing list.



Mission:

Committed to the rich, complex literary legacy of Flannery O'Connor, Andalusia Institute provides a venue where scholarship flourishes, the creative process deepens, and knowledge grows through the inspiration of O'Connor's work. As part of the desire to support O'Connor's legacy, the Institute exists to nurture fresh approaches to the arts and humanities through the innovative collaboration of all types of students and learners—artists, community members, and scholars. Situated in Milledgeville, Georgia, Andalusia Institute is at once regional, national, and international in focus, offerings, and educational outreach. Doing our work at the heart of the liberal arts mission of Georgia College, the Andalusia Institute is devoted to the arts and humanities in its many expressions, while contributing to the cultural vibrancy and economic well-being of the community.

Highlights 2021-2022:

This year revealed the continuing importance of the public arts and humanities as offered by the Andalusia Institute. Highlights of the year include:

Writing for Success

The Andalusia Institute received a federal earmark for \$385,000 for development of a 5th grade literacy module using O'Connor's work in partnership with the Baldwin County School District from the Department of Education thanks to Senator Warnock's office.

Baldwin County School District's fifth grade teachers will develop the module which will include multi-modal study of communications through writing and podcasting as well as enrichment from work with trained tutors from the Georgia College student body.

Peacock Symposium

Daniel Wallace, the J. Ross MacDonald Distinguished Professor of English at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and director of their Creative Writing program, joined us for the Peacock Symposium this year. Wallace has written six novels (Big Fish, Ray in Reverse, The Watermelon King, Mr. Sebastian and the Negro Magician, The King and Queens of Roam, and Extraordinary Adventures), one children's book (The Cat's Pajamas), and one coloring book (with Emily Wallace, Roadside Attractions) as well as numerous short stories and essays.

Big Fish was made into a movie (directed by Tim Burton) in 2003 and then into a Broadway musical in 2013. In 2019, he won the Harper Lee Award for a living, nationally recognized Alabama writer who has made a significant lifelong contribution to Alabama letters.

Activities associated with this were a public, outdoor showing of the film on the front lawn of Georgia College in early September, a virtual session by Wallace on Flannery O'Connor's writing, an Honors College program/discussion on the process of turning Big Fish into a movie/show, a craft class for Creative Writing undergrad and grad students, and a reading and evening lecture open to the general public but live-streamed to our virtual audience.

Virtual Events

Fall 2021: Ten virtual events were held in the Fall of 202. Aside from the events of the Peacock Symposium, Dr. Bruce Gentry led four sessions on the O'Connor novel, Wise Blood, and some of her short stories. In addition, Dr. Christine Flanagan led a discussion on the letters between Flannery O'Connor and Caroline Gordon. Karen Coonrod of Yale University had her Compagnia de'Colombari do a radio performance of O'Connor's "Revelation." Finally, Taylor Black, Monica Miller, Bruce Henderson, and Amy Alznauer discussed O'Connor's embrace of oddity and otherness in her life and work.

SPRING 2022:

Nine virtual events were scheduled for the Spring. Dr. Bruce Gentry led five discussions of Flannery O'Connor's novel, The Violent Bear It Away, several short stories, and some of her essays. Daniel Moran, author of Creating Flannery O'Connor, led a conversation on the creation of Flannery O'Connor as an important literary influence of the 20th century. Dr. Irwin Streight, Royal Military College of Canada, author of the forthcoming Flannery at the Grammys, discussed the impact that O'Connor's work has had on contemporary music from Springsteen and REM to heavy metal and Lucinda Williams. "A Lifetime with Flannery O'Connor," celebrated the release of Dr. Bruce Gentry's book of his own essays about Flannery O'Connor, Better to See You With: Perspectives on Flannery O'Connor, Selected and New, forthcoming from the Mercer University Press. To wrap up the year, Dr. Ruthann Johansen and Dr. E. Jane Doering talked about the connections between Flannery O'Connor and the mid-century philosopher, Simone Weil.

Impact

As our mission states, the Andalusia Institute focuses on outreach. Currently, we have almost 500 Facebook Followers as well as almost 600 individuals on our mailing list.

For most virtual events, we have between 30 and 60 participants with 90-100 for the most popular.

Our participants come from across the United States and around the world, including Turkey, Italy, Brazil, Saudi Arabia, and India.

Our participants include scholars, teachers, students, and many private individuals who enjoy the arts and humanities.
