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# ABOUT THE INSTITUTION

Georgia College & State University is Georgia’s designated public liberal arts university and offers undergraduate programs of study in an inviting residential-college setting to students motivated to make a difference.

Students, faculty and staff members of Georgia College collaborate with the communities of Middle Georgia to provide invaluable educational experiences and make enriching contributions to the local area of Milledgeville and beyond. The university also provides graduate and professional studies, in person and online, to students who are looking to advance their careers.

### Beginnings

The university was founded in 1889 as a public women’s educational center. First known as Georgia Normal & Industrial College, the university has been called Georgia State College for Women, the Women’s College of Georgia, Georgia College, and since 1996, Georgia College & State University.

### Accreditation

Georgia College & State University is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges to award baccalaureate, master’s and doctorate degrees. ### Colleges

Georgia College has programs of study in five colleges: the College of Arts & Sciences, the J. Whitney Bunting College of Business & Technology, the John H. Lounsbury College of Education, the College of Health Sciences and the John E. Sallstrom Honors College.

### Class Sizes

As Georgia’s designated public liberal arts university, small classes that give ample opportunity for individual student attention are common. Three of every four classes at GCSU have fewer than 30 students. More than half of our classes have 20 students or less.

### Total Economic Impact Locally

The economic impact of the university on a six-county region is calculated to be more than \$333 million for fiscal year 2024, according to a study released in 2025 by the University System of Georgia. That amount is a \$25 million, or 8.1% increase over 2021.

### Tuition Fiscal Year 25-26

In-state tuition for a full-time undergraduate student is \$4,588 per semester. Out-of-state tuition for a full-time undergraduate student is \$15,031 per semester.

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

### Distribution of Revenue by Source Fiscal Year 2024-25







## Distribution of Expenditures by Function Fiscal Year 2024-2025




## Distribution of Sponsored Expenditures by Function Fiscal Year 2024-25



# THE LEARNING CENTER CENTER FOR STUDENT SUCCESS

The Learning Center provides enrolled students with the academic support they need to be more confident with course content as well as tips and tools with how to effectively use their study time. Certified Peer Tutors work 1-on-1 and in small group settings assisting with STEM and economics courses in our drop-in Learning Center. Supplemental Instruction Leaders (SI) are embedded in and dedicated to one course for the entire semester; the leaders facilitate two interactive, collaborative SI study sessions for the enrolled students each week. The Math Lab supports two specific math classes with a team of Undergraduate Learning Assistants who assist with course concepts and learning strategies.









### Distribution of Degree and Major Awards by Degree Level, Fiscal Year 2024-25




### Number of Degree and Major Awards by Degree Level





4-Year Graduation Rate








## STATEWIDE PROGRAMS

We are responsible for promoting access to evidence-based resources through training, workshops, speaking events, community initiatives, and more. We compile and translate research to inform and share.

In fiscal year 2025, the Deal Center maintained and expanded our programs and initiatives for improving teacher preparation, supporting literacy professionals, and offering high-quality instructional materials.

Our largest programming event, the Governor’s Summit on Early Language and Literacy, is a conference designed to coalesce the state’s language and literacy professionals on Georgia College’s campus. At this free conference, we invite national experts to speak, give breakouts, and share emerging research to attendees.

This year was our largest Governor’s Summit ever, almost reaching max capacity for our conference space.

The Deal Center is experiencing an all-time-high of demand for our services and expertise. With our growing team, we plan to support this demand in a way that continues our dedication to the dissemination of accurate and rigorous early language and literacy research.

## GRANT COMPETITIONS

In fiscal year 2025, the Deal Center held two grant competitions, awarding **\$448,184** in grant funding.

We distributed funding to literacy-focused organizations across Georgia, supporting early language and literacy initiatives that directly impact children, families, and educators.


In addition, the Deal Center supported five researchers who explored how evidence-based practices are adopted, implemented, sustained, and scaled within organizations serving children and families from birth through age 8.

We saw a 71% increase in Community Coalition grant applications submitted to the Deal Center, reflecting both the growing demand for our support and our expanding statewide footprint.

# RURAL STUDIES INSTITUTE

GEORGIA COLLEGE & STATE UNIVERSITY

## MISSION:

The Rural Studies Institute (RSI) at Georgia College & State University serves to highlight and strengthen rural communities as a catalyst for community education and engagement, community-based participatory research and scholarship. The work of the RSI at Georgia College & State University is grounded in interdisciplinary discovery and collaborative approach to identify innovative solutions to the challenges facing rural communities. The Institute does this by advancing thought leadership, community awareness, exploration, and ideas that examine societal priorities, policy, practice and existing institutional structures that impact the well-being of rural communities. In operation since January 2020, the Institute was established to address rural disparities, with particular focus on the Southern region. The RSI at Georgia College aims to build asset focused approaches to rural sustainability, development and growth. Supporting the liberal arts mission of the Institute, the RSI at Georgia College & State University is dedicated to building the capacity of rural communities through transformations of narrative, action and practice.

## HIGHLIGHTS FOR 2023-2024:

The RSI focused on four areas of action: Thought Leadership, Original Research, and Education and Outreach efforts. Community Technical Assistance The RSI at Georgia College & State University provides thought leadership and technical assistance to various constituents to address disparities in rural communities. With an interest in rural economies, RSI supports local, state and national intentional rural development strategies. Serving as a local community champion and thought leader, the RSI established and strengthened existing partnerships

in order to accomplish its goals. Local partnerships include the CREATE (Cultivating Rural Entrepreneurs and Transforming Economies) program with Milledgeville Main Street, Milledgeville Baldwin Chamber, and Georgia Power Company, and PROPEL (Planning Rural Opportunities for Prosperity and Economic Leadership), led by the University of Georgia and the local development authority.

The Rural Studies Institute also partnered with state partners including membership on the Drawdown Georgia Drawdown Research Advisory Team and the Center for Sustainable Communities Research and Education (SCoRE) at the Georgia Institute of Technology (Ga Tech), serving as an external advisor. Transformative Learning Experiences The RSI also continued to support Transformative Learning experiences with students in order fulfill the mission of the institution. As a result, the RSI was selected to serve as a host site for PIN (Partnership for Innovation) Summer internship program. The institute hosted a student from Georgia College & State University and a student from the University of Georgia who helped work on rural economic development strategy. The RSI also hosted a Georgia Tech (SCoRE) intern for the summer who also worked on rural issues. In addition, the RSI was also invited to present a virtual presentation on working in rural places entitled “Outside the City Limits Thought Engagement and Working the Rural Places” for the PIN program, reaching students from around the country.

## IMPACT:

Presentations/Facilitations on Rural America: The Rural Studies Institute at Georgia College & State University provided education and outreach opportunities on rural America with a diverse group of

constituents and stakeholders including campus stakeholders at Georgia College & State University, was featured for the regional convening for the Together For Hope organization, which is dedicated to alleviating underdevelopment in the Southern region.

## EVENT

The Rural Studies Institute at Georgia College hosted its first virtual “Feast for Thought” GCSU faculty lecture series. The event discussed the connection among food, society, and the environment and the liberal arts. The lecturers included Dr. Sandra Godwin (Sociology), Dr. Stephanie Opperman (History), Dr. Trae Welborn (History), Dr. Katie Simon (English). The event had 101 participants from around the country.

## PARTNERS IN RSI WORK

The RSI at Georgia College & State University established and strengthened existing partnerships to accomplish the goals of the Institute. These partners include the Drawdown Georgia Business Compact, Milledgeville Baldwin County Chamber, Milledgeville MainStreet, the Butler Baker Committee in Eatonton GA, and the Community Strategies Group Aspen Institute, Thrive Rural Action Learning Exchange (TRALE), the Center for Sustainable Communities Research and Education (SCoRE) and Partnership for Innovation (PIN) and the University of Nebraska National Advisory Committee (NAC) for the University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC) College of Public Health Center for Metrics and Evaluation. As a public institute, the RSI at Georgia College focuses on outreach to the community and currently and has an active social media presence on Facebook and through email listserv.

# THE FLANNERY O'CONNOR INSTITUTE FOR THE HUMANITIES

## **Mission:**

Committed to the rich, complex literary legacy of our namesake, the Flannery O'Connor Institute for the Humanities (FOIH) provides a venue where scholarship flourishes, the creative process deepens, and knowledge grows through the inspiration of O'Connor's work. As part of the desire to support O'Connor's legacy, the Institute exists to nurture fresh approaches to the arts and humanities through the innovative collaboration of all types of students and learners—scholars, students, artists, and community members. Situated in Milledgeville, Georgia, the Flannery O'Connor Institute for the Humanities is at once regional, national, and international in focus, offerings, and educational outreach. Doing our work at the heart of the liberal arts mission of Georgia College, the FOIH is devoted to the arts and humanities in its many expressions, while contributing to the cultural vibrancy and economic well-being of the community.

## **Highlights 2024-2025:**

Interim Executive Director Dr. Katie Simon stepped in during the summer of 2024, taking over for Jordan Cofer, and she hit the ground running with the September 2024 conference (see below) and the wrap up and final reporting for three federal grants. The U.S. Department of Education Grant "Writing for Success," the National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Seminar Grant, and the National Endowment for the Humanities Collecting the Past grants all came under her purview. She also began planning a robust year of activities leading up to the centennial celebration of O'Connor's birth in March of 2025. Highlights included an art opening and lecture, a music festival, and a screening of Ethan Hawke's film *Wildcat*. She has convened an Advisory Board consisting of: Dr. Monica Miller, Dr. Bruce Gentry, Dr. Adam Wood, Dr. Matt Bryant Cheney, Dr. Jordan Cofer, and Dr. Kerry Evans. Because she is a temporary interim, this is a one-year commitment for board members. Frequently speaking to the press, Dr. Simon appeared last

year on Georgia Public Broadcasting/ National Public Radio, and was featured in *Smithsonian Magazine*, the *Atlanta Journal Constitution*, *Arts Atlanta*, *Gardens and Guns*, and *No Depression Magazine*. Other articles about Flannery O'Connor appeared last year in the *New Yorker* and *The New York Times*. Supporting junior scholarship, the FOIH hosted Jack Love, a graduate student at Texas A and M University, to conduct original research in Special Collections in the second annual Laidlaw Fellowship.

## **"Looking Forward, Looking Back."**

Scholarly Conference on the GCSU campus. The FOIH organized and hosted a 4-day scholarly conference on the GCSU Campus September 12-15, 2024. With support from the 2023 National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Institute grant, we partnered with NEH Project Directors Dr. Bruce Gentry and Dr. Robert Donahoo to bring together 4 keynote presenters, 90-panel presenters, and over 250 audience members for a fantastic international event. We hosted two book release parties, several receptions, and brought crowds to visit Andalusia, the Flannery O'Connor home. In addition, many of our panels were able to feature GCSU faculty and students, showcasing our robust intellectual and creative culture. The entire conference was free and open to the public, with the support of the NEH grant, and we were able to hire a team of paid student interns to attain career-readiness skills in event planning, publicity, and technical assistance.

## **Southern Gothic Lecture Series**

In its inaugural year, the Institute brought two speakers to campus for the new Southern Gothic Lecture Series. On February 4, 2025 Sara Crosby of the Ohio State University gave an engaging lecture entitled "Save the Rougarou! . . . and the Wetlands: Cajun Folk Horror and Environmental Activism in America's Petroleum Sacrifice Zone." Situating the disappearing wetlands in Louisiana within an autobiographical frame drawing upon her own Cajun heritage, Crosby examines

the subversive use of a denigrated folk hero as it gets repurposed to call attention to environmental devastation. On February 25, 2025 we brought Vanderbilt Professor Teresa Goddu for an eloquent talk entitled "Jesmyn Ward's *Ecogothic*." Situating Ward's novel *Sing, Unburied*, *Sing* within the context of the environmental humanities and the genre of climate fiction, Goddu opened up pathways for thinking about the intersections of petroculture, drug addiction, trauma and race within a Southern Gothic frame. Free and open to the public, these lectures were well-attended and included receptions.

## **Collecting the Past: Flannery O'Connor and Milledgeville Oral History**

(National Endowment for the Humanities) The Institute finished up its second year of the three-year grant that had been awarded by the NEH, totaling \$149,000 for an oral history project. Led by Co-PI Dr. Stephanie Opperman and Project Coordinator Lani Daniel, the project recorded oral histories of those who knew and interacted with Flannery O'Connor, lived in Milledgeville during the mid-twentieth century, or have family roots in the area. The FOIH provided technical and administrative support to host the oral histories and transcripts on Knowledge Box, where they serve as a digital resource for scholars. We also hosted a number of events and conference presentations to publicize the findings of this grant. Dr. Opperman published Highlights from the "Collecting the Past" grant in Vol. 23 of the *Flannery O'Connor Review*, synthesizing the data for researchers. The transcripts and recordings are available at <https://kb.gcsu.edu/collectingthepast>. This NEH grant was terminated early by the present Administration, so we wrapped up and filed the final report in May of 2024. We are proud of the significant data collected in the two years and we plan to leverage this research for future digital humanities and grant projects.
